Get winter ready!

With the winter season around the corner, it is important we are getting our communities prepared and protected from getting sick with illnesses including influenza and COVID-19. An increase in COVID-19 cases was reported nationally after Easter weekend and we observed a spike in our hospital inpatient numbers testing positive. Please remind everyone to report their RAT results online through My Covid Record so that we can continue to have an accurate reflection of case numbers in our communities.

Having COVID-19 does not provide the same level of immunity as getting vaccinated. We also know that protection from the primary course of the vaccine decreases over time. It is important to keep immunity levels high, please encourage everyone to stay up to date with their vaccinations, including boosters. This will lower the chances of people getting very sick from COVID-19 and ending up in hospital.

Yearly flu vaccines are important as each year the flu is caused by different strains, which may not be included in the previous year's vaccine. Although getting the flu vaccine does not guarantee you won't catch the flu, it will provide more protection and best defence against the flu. This means people are less likely to experience complications from a flu infection.

Flu vaccinations are now available at local pharmacies and GP practices, we encourage everyone who is eligible to get both their COVID-19 booster and flu vaccination to

ensure that they are well protected ahead of winter.

The flu and COVID-19 vaccines can be given at the same time. Both the flu and COVID-19 vaccines can be booked online through Book My Vaccine. Alternatively, people can call COVID-19 Vaccination Healthline on 0800 28 29 26 (8am to 8pm, 7 days a week) to book a COVID-19 vaccine. Interpreters are available upon request.

New COVID-19 booster eligibility (Pfizer BA.4/5 bivalent vaccine)

The Pfizer BA.4/5 bivalent vaccine is an updated vaccine targeting Omicron. The bivalent vaccine has replaced the existing Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine for boosters and causes the immune system to create antibodies to both the original SARS-CoV-2 and Omicron BA.4 and BA.5 sub-variants. Current evidence indicates the bivalent vaccine is more effective against Omicron sub-variants than earlier vaccines.

COVID-19 vaccines are free. As of 1 April 2023 (regardless of how many boosters you have had) the bivalent booster is available for people who have completed a primary vaccination course and are:

- aged 30 years and over
- at higher risk of severe illness from COVID-19

It will need to be at least 6 months since the last COVID-19 vaccine or positive COVID-19 test. The bivalent booster is recommended for eligible pregnant people at any stage of pregnancy or during breastfeeding.

Flu vaccine eligibility

The 2023 flu vaccine is also now available. It is recommended that everyone over 6 months old gets an annual flu vaccine.

The Flu vaccine is free for:

- Pregnant people (any trimester)
- People aged 65 years older
- Tamariki aged 6 months to 12 years old
- Māori and Pacific peoples aged 55 to 64 years
- Anyone with underlying health conditions including heart disease, cancer, diabetes and serious asthma
- Anyone with schizophrenia, major depressive disorder, bipolar disorder, or schizoaffective disorder
- Anyone currently accessing mental health and addiction services

Please answer all the questions on this form before submitting. The referrals are triaged to ensure that the baby/neonate/infant meets the criteria to have the vaccination. The appointments are allocated in order of referral dates. There is currently about a 3-4 week wait time. If you have questions around BCG vaccination please leave a message on 021 247 8964.

Vaccinations for year 7 and 8 students (Boostrix & HPV)

This is a reminder that these vaccinations are administered through the annual school based vaccination programme here in the

Waikato. To avoid duplication and confusion, the public health nurses who run this programme are requesting that GPs only recall their patients who have missed these vaccinations at school (and are now overdue for their year 7 and 8 vaccinations) once they have turned 14 years of age.
